MOSIER CITY COUNCIL MEETING

MARCH 7, 2018 at 6:30 P.M.

I	CALL TO ORDER: Mayor Burns called meeting to order at 6:30 pm.
II	Council: All Council members in attendance Staff: City Manager, Colleen Coleman, City Recorder, Jayme Bennett Audience: Rod Runyon, Wasco County Commissioner, Walter Burt, GIS consultant presentation to Council, Marty Mcgee, Mosier, Megan Pingree, Mosier, Scott Hege, Wasco County Commissioner
III	Business from the Audience <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Marty Mcgee, of Mosier, came to speak to Council about pedestrian safety concerns given the road width, stanchions and current parking on the street where 3rd turns into Center Street heading south. The stanchions and rock walls further prevent one car from pulling over on the shoulder to allow for passage of oncoming traffic or create room for pedestrian traffic.- Discussion ensued around available space for parking for local residents near the intersection of Center and 3rd Streets. Council member Wallace mentioned concerns for how quickly cars come down the hill from Center Street heading to 3rd and spoke to the stanchions as possible deterrents from speeding or unsafe driving practices. Also, the parking on the East side of Center Street as your approach 3rd Ave is further restricting visibility and flow of traffic.- City Manager Coleman said she would speak with John Grimm, City Engineer, and come back to Council with a few viable suggestions for improvement.
IV	Council member Gries moved to approve minutes, with noted corrections from 2/21/2018, Council member Wallace seconded, all approved.
V	BUSINESS
1.	Walter Burt, of GSI Water Solutions came to give a presentation to Council and residents of Mosier on the Mosier water resources, and relationship to back-up water for the City: <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Walter Burt has been studying the Mosier water table since 2010 and recently gave a presentation to the Watershed Council, which is available on their website at www.wasco.swcd.org in Power Point format.- Mr. Burt gave an overview of the geological and other existing conditions (Columbia River Basalts) which shape the relationship to the groundwater in the City and groundwater in the watershed, which are naturally divided by the thrust fault.- It was determined the decrease in Psi on the lower Syncline was from heavy use of irrigation. Furthermore, in 1985 the Oregon Water Resources Department found the commingling of domestic wells to be the largest contributing factor to the decline in the water table level for the watershed overall.- Councilor Anderson inquired about the percentage of demand (agriculture vs. domestic); Mr. Burt's response was 80% agricultural, 10% City of Mosier and 10% domestic, outside of City limits.- Mr. Burt shared his extensive knowledge through working with local, regional, and State level resource groups on strategies to alleviate the pressure on the system overall, recharge the water table and prevent further commingling through stabilizing the watershed, increasing the base flow and ensuring any actions taken are viable for the agricultural economy.- Mr. Burt gave the Council a summary of the health and viability of the City wells in Mosier, with the associated water rights. He further explained the steps they have taken to assist the agricultural

	<p>community in facilitating new well placement on different water tables from the rest of the watershed, as well as assisting domestic wells in properly incasing their commingling wells.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - City Manager inquired as to the best way forward for us to ensure we are complying and engaging with the watershed. Mr. Burt suggested attending the SWCD meetings and get to know the water resource entities so they are familiar with our active role in the solutions process and familiar with our unique set of problems.
2.	<p>Budget</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Colleen Coleman proposed to make a resolution (2018-01) for the City Budget Officer to be the City Manager, rather than make a motion every year to appoint the officer. City attorney Laura Westmeyer suggested this as the best way forward. Councilor Wallace made a motion to approve, Councilor Berry seconded, all approved.
3.	<p>Mosier Ordinance – Plastic Bag and Styrofoam Ban Public Reading.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Mayor Burns introduced Ordinance #172 (Health 8.65) Restrictions on single use plastic bags and styrofoam with the additional restriction of plastic straws to this ordinance. - The ordinance was read publicly by all members of the council for the first time on March 7, 2018 at 8:26 p.m.
4.	<p>Announcements</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Marc Berry’s Council position was appointed to Witt Anderson, as Mark resigned. The position will expire December 31, 2018. - Penny Wallace’s position on City Council will expire December 31, 2018 - Mayor Burn’s position expires December 31, 2018 - Council member Van Osdol’s position will expire December 31, 2018. - The first day to file with an interest to run for Council is May 30, 2018 and the last day to file is August 28, 2018. - Councilor Van Osdol reported on her attendance of the Mosier School safety meeting with many positive messages about the level of preparedness, and professionalism from Wasco County Sheriff, Lane Magill. He was forthcoming on the importance of the safety of children in schools and the importance of planning and communications. - Councilor Anderson and City Manager spoke with Friends of the Gorge regarding the challenges for the one mile of land between Mosier and The Dalles that currently does not have a trail. Scott Hege suggested getting together with the County and the City of The Dalles regarding similar and aligned interests to see if there is more support to complete the remaining mile. - City Manager mentioned the Mosier Mounds to the Friends of the Gorge to see if it was of interest for preservation; they were unclear if the land was within their mission and suggested approaching the Tribes. Councilor Wallace informed the Council the Warm Springs Tribe representatives visited the site prior to sale and they were not interested at that time. - Councilor Gries informed the City Council that the light on Idaho and 2nd street has been fixed and is no longer a nuisance.
5.	<p>Mayor Burns adjourned the City Council meeting at 8:47 pm.</p>

Re: Proposal for Bond Counsel Services – USDA Loan (Water System Project)

Dear John:

I am pleased, on behalf of Foster Pepper PLLC (“Foster Pepper”), to present this proposal to provide bond counsel services to the City of Mosier, Oregon (the “City”). This letter provides a brief description of Foster Pepper, and outlines the legal services that we would expect to provide to the City as bond counsel in connection with the issuance of a water revenue bond through the United States Department of Agriculture (“USDA”) to finance water system improvements and the interim loan for the project. We at Foster Pepper would be pleased to serve the City in connection with these financings.

Foster Pepper is a professional limited liability company established in 1904 with attorneys practicing in Seattle and Spokane, Washington. Foster Pepper has been nationally recognized as bond counsel for more than 70 years. Foster Pepper attorneys have served as bond counsel, underwriter’s counsel, general counsel and special counsel to over 450 governmental agencies in Alaska, Idaho, Montana, Oregon and Washington, and has substantial experience in USDA financings.

As bond counsel to the City, we would expect to perform the following duties:

1. Advise the City concerning the legal requirements applicable to the issuance and sale of a revenue bond and the interim financing obligation.
2. Provide representation of bond counsel (in person or by phone) at all meetings held by the City during the period of issuance and sale of the proposed bond and the interim financing when appropriate and when so directed by the City.

3. Prepare the necessary proceedings, notices and other documents necessary for the authorization, issuance and sale of an interim financing obligation to a bank, and for the sale of the bond to USDA. The bond documents shall be prepared in advance of the bond issue as is required by USDA.

4. Provide such other legal guidance and assistance, supervision and consultation, conduct such proceedings and provide such opinions as may be appropriate.

5. Supervise the printing and delivery of the interim financing obligation to the bank and the bond to USDA and prepare all closing documents.

6. Assemble and examine a transcript concerning all proceedings taken in connection with the issuance and sale of the interim financing and the bond.

7. Upon completion of all proceedings and upon our determination that all such proceedings and interim financing obligation and bond are valid, provide to the City and the purchaser our legal opinion approving the validity of all proceedings for the authorization and issuance of the interim financing and bond and their delivery and stating the status of interest on such interim financing and bond under the federal tax laws.

Foster Pepper represents many political subdivisions, companies, and individuals. It is possible that during the time that we are representing the City, one or more of our present or future clients will have transactions with the City. We do not foresee that any such representation, if it occurs, will adversely affect our ability to represent the City as provided in this letter, either because such matters will be sufficiently different from the issuance of the obligations so as to make such representations not adverse to our representation of the City, or because the potential for such adversity is remote or minor and outweighed by the consideration that it is unlikely that advice given to the other client will be relevant to any aspect of the issuance of the obligations. Execution of this letter will signify the City's consent to our representation of others consistent with the circumstances described in this paragraph.

We also call to your attention that Foster Pepper occasionally represents banks that may purchase the City's debt. We would not represent a bank on matters involving the City. By signing this letter, the City waives any conflict of interest as a result of our representation of banks on unrelated matters for bond or note issues not involving the City.

Our fees would be charged on a fixed fee basis. The fee is charged when and if the interim financing and bond are issued. As compensation for performing the services set forth above, our fees would be \$3,500 for the interim financing and \$5,000 for the bond (inclusive of costs).

Thank you for your willingness to support the Mosier Deep Water Supply Wells project, once again. I have attached a letter that was written recently by Shilah Olson, our District Manager, to OWRD, about the project's background and progress, and explaining why we are requesting more funds.

During construction of the first of the 2 deep wells we experienced challenges that were unanticipated, which resulted in additional costs. The lessons we learned from the first well will guide us in the design and construction of the second well.

We had hoped OWRD would consider an extension to the original grant, however, they are requiring us to apply for a new grant for funds that will allow us to complete the project.

2018 Wasco County Community Enhancement Projects

<i>Priority</i>	<i>Project Sponsor</i>	<i>Project</i>
1	Deschutes Rim Clinic Foundation	<u>Medical Clinic Expansion</u> Deschutes Rim Clinic Foundation has completed their feasibility study, and are moving forward with fundraising efforts to expand the health clinic in Maupin . The Clinic received \$1 million in funding from the Oregon State Legislature for the project and substantial local donations.
2	Wasco County SWCD	<u>Mosier Well Repair</u> This project seeks to repair the co-mingling wells in the area around Mosier. Study of the problem continues as local property owners allow SWCD to scope wells to identify issues. Additionally, in partnership with one of the two largest water users, the SWCD supported boring a new deep well to replace old, comingling well. However, this project came in significantly over budget and the SWCD has used most of the resources they received to address the two largest users for this first attempt.
3	City of Mosier/ Mosier Fire District	<u>Joint Fire Hall/City Hall Development</u> The City of Mosier and the Mosier Fire District areceived \$500,000 for facility as well as the land the site through their negotiations with Union Pacific Railroad. They were also successful in receiving \$500,000 from the Oregon Legislature for the project. This will provide a strong foundation for continued resource development moving forward.
4	City of Maupin/Q-Life Network	<u>Maupin Fiber Network</u> The Maupin Fiber Project will bring gigabit speed internet access to homes and residents throughout the City of Maupin in addition to supporting improved wireless access throughout South Wasco County. With approximately \$900,000 invested or committed into bringing connectivity to Maupin, another \$500,000 is still needed to build out to residents, businesses, and community institutions.
5	City of The Dalles	<u>Dog River Pipeline Upgrade</u> City of The Dalles staff applied for grant funding from Oregon Water Resource Department to help fund the pipeline. The EDC was able to provide a letter of support for the project as well as some support during application development. However, they were not awarded funding by OWRD. The City has continued to move through the permitting process for the project and is still seeking funding.
6	Columbia Gorge	<u>Campus Housing and Workforce Training Skill Center</u> Reginal employers need skilled workers in wide-ranging fields.

	Community College	CGCC will respond through a workforce pipeline program emphasizing short-duration career-tech training with focus on high school to post-secondary transition and the incumbent workforce. Instructional programming will be informed by data, guided by industry, and physically supported by a Skill Center on The Dalles Campus with on-site workforce housing.
7	City of Maupin/ South Wasco County Library	<u>South Wasco County Library and Civic Center</u> The City Council in Maupin made an official decision to pursue the joint building and have purchased a site located next to the park in their downtown core for the development. They made a legislative request in the 2018 Short Session and are continuing to work toward identifying resources to complete this project.
8	Port of The Dalles	<u>Gorge Works Regional Internship Program</u> Gorge Works is a regional paid internship program in its pilot phase, supported by regional employers seeking skilled workforce, and regional economic development agencies. The Port is seeking \$25,000 to help fund added staffing capacity and marketing initiatives to fully establish the program. They are hoping to prove the value of this program to employers and job seekers over a two-year pilot period.
9	City of Mosier	<u>Well #5 Development and Eastside System Upgrades</u> The City of Mosier participated in a one-stop meeting with the various water system funding agencies to identify a path for financing this project as well as their Eastside Distribution System Improvements. They are currently working toward an application to USDA RD for funding of these two projects.
10	Dufur School District	<u>Solar4Schools Project</u> Dufur School District seeks to participate with Bonneville Environmental Foundation (BEF) in implementing the solar4schools program at the main campus in Dufur, OR. Total project cost is estimated to be \$65,000 with \$15,000 in matching funds required. This project will include the installation of a 5 kW Solar PV system at the main campus in Dufur, OR. BEF will provide staff and assistance to provide education, project monitoring, and support to school administration for 10 years. This will provide an opportunity for students in Dufur to gain hands on experience with green technology and renewable energy.

Dear Kim,

The City of Mosier has been coping with the impacts of commingling wells and declining water levels for many years. The City spent well over \$100,000 to fix and finally decommission Mosier City Well #3 that was found to be commingling. This left the City with only one good well, City Well #4. In the summer of 2015, the water level in City Well #4 declined 28'. The city engineer has recommended that the City plan to develop a backup well.

The City has also invested significantly to upgrade its water and sewer system and install water meters, thus enabling the city and its residents to find and fix leaks and improve their water conservation efforts. These projects have left residents with a minimum water bill of approximately \$100/month. Meanwhile, the water situation in Mosier has impacted sales of properties in the city.

The City understands that the Wasco Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) along with two local orchardists, is applying for a second grant from OWRD to complete the Mosier Deep Water Supply Wells. The goal of the project is to relieve demand on the main groundwater aquifer used by the City of Mosier and many others, by drilling 2 deeper wells that will be used by the two largest irrigators. The first well was completed under the original grant, however, challenges encountered with the first well led to an increase in project costs.

If these orchardists were to pump from different aquifers than the City, that would hopefully relieve the pressure on, and declines in, the aquifer the City uses. Eliminating the declines in the City well would be of immense benefit to the City of Mosier. Furthermore, if these wells show that the water quality and quantity in the deeper aquifer is good, the City may consider using those aquifers in the future.

This project has been listed as a top priority project in 2018 by the Wasco County Economic Development Commission. It will greatly benefit both the City of Mosier, and the surrounding Mosier area community.

The City of Mosier supports this grant proposal that would allow both Mosier Deep Water Supply Wells to be completed.

ORDINANCE NO. 172

An Ordinance Amending Title 8 (Health and Safety) of the Mosier Municipal Code, by Adding a New Chapter 8.65 (Single-Use Plastics and Polystyrene Takeout Materials) and Imposing Restrictions on the Distribution of Single-Use Plastic Bags, Plastic Straws and Polystyrene Foam Containers in the City.

WHEREAS, the City of Mosier is an Oregon home-rule charter municipal corporation with a City Charter that grants it all the powers and authority that the constitution, statutes, and common law of the United States and this State expressly or implied, grant or allow as though each such power was specifically enumerated; and

WHEREAS, as a City that is located on the Columbia River that drains into the Pacific Ocean, too many single-use plastic bags, plastic straws and polystyrene foam containers are released or find their way into the local environment and the Columbia River, either being blown by the wind or as part of stormwater flow; and

WHEREAS, plastic consumer waste, including single-use plastic bags, plastic straws and polystyrene foam (styrofoam) cups and containers are a significant form of highly persistent environmental pollution that is harmful to wildlife; and

WHEREAS, plastic bag, plastic straw and polystyrene foam contamination of yard debris, household compost, wastepaper recycling, and other waste recovery streams damages sorting and processing machinery, impedes resource recovery, and contaminates loads of otherwise reusable or recyclable material; and

WHEREAS, the use of reusable bags and recyclable containers for day-to-day retail purchases reduces these troubling sources of contamination and reduces the need to manufacture plastic film from raw material, collect, and then discard to landfills after a single use; and

WHEREAS, the City aims to be a leader in Environmental Sustainability; and

WHEREAS, the City desires to amend the Mosier Municipal Code by adopting Chapter 8.65, set forth in the attached Exhibit A, and held a duly noticed public hearing for consideration of single-use plastic bags, plastic straws, and polystyrene foam regulations at its regular meeting on March 7, 2018, at which time the Council will take public testimony on the proposal.

NOW THEREFORE, the City of Mosier ordains as follows:

Section 1. Amendment. Title 8 (Health and Safety) of the Mosier Municipal Code is hereby amended by adding a new Chapter 8.65 (Single-Use Plastic Bags, Plastic Straws, and Polystyrene Foam containers) consisting of the provisions set forth in Exhibit A, attached hereto and incorporated herein by this reference.

Section 2. Severability. If any provision, paragraph, word, section, or article of this Ordinance or the Mosier Municipal Code Chapter 8.65 is invalidated by any court of competent jurisdiction, the remaining provisions, paragraphs, words, sections, and articles shall not be affected and shall continue in full force and effect.

READ FOR THE FIRST TIME on March 7, 2018.

READ FOR THE SECOND TIME and adopted on April 4, 2018. This Ordinance shall take effect on the thirtieth day after adoption.

Exhibit A

Chapter 8.65 - SINGLE-USE PLASTIC BAGS AND STYROFOAM CONTAINERS

Sections:

8.65.010 - Definitions

8.65.020 - Supervision and Enforcement by the City Manager

8.65.030 - Retail Bag, Styrofoam Container and Plastic Straw Regulations

8.65.040 - Enforcement and Penalties

8.65.010 - Definitions.

For purposes of this Chapter:

1. "City" means the City of Mosier, Oregon.
2. "City Manager" means the City Manager for the City of Mosier or the City Manager's designee.
3. "Food Provider" means any store, shop, restaurant, cart, or vendor located within the City of Mosier that sells food or beverage to customers.
4. "Recyclable Paper Bag" means a paper bag that meets all of the following requirements:
 - a) Is 100% recyclable and contains a minimum of 40% post-consumer recycled content;
5. "Retail Establishment" means any store, shop, sales outlet, or vendor located within the City of Mosier that sells goods at retail.
6. "Reusable Bag" means a bag that is either:
 - a) Made of cloth or other machine washable material, or
 - b) Made of durable plastic that is at least 2 mils thick.
7. "Single-Use Plastic Bag" means a plastic bag made from synthetic or natural organic materials that is provided by a Retail Establishment or Food Retailer to a customer at the point of sale for use to transport or carry away purchases from the establishment or retailer.
8. "Polystyrene Foam Containers" means cups, take out containers, and similar, single-use food and drink containers made of polystyrene material.
9. "Plastic Straws" means take out straws for single-use food and drink containers made of plastic or synthetic material.
10. "Biodegradable Paper Straws" means straws used for take out food and drinks made from biodegradable paper.

8.65.020 - Supervision and Enforcement by the City Manager. The regulation and enforcement of Single-use Plastic Bags, Styrofoam Containers and Plastic Straws under this Chapter shall be under the supervision of the City Manager or the City Manager's designee.

8.65.030 - Retail Bag, Styrofoam Container and Plastic Straw Regulations.

1. Prohibition on Single-use Plastic Bags, Styrofoam Containers and Plastic Straws. Retail Establishments and Food Providers shall not provide or make available Single-use Plastic Bags, non-Recyclable Paper Bags, Styrofoam Containers or Plastic Straws.

2. Availability of Reusable Bags and Recyclable Straws, Cups and Containers. Retail Establishments and Food Providers shall make Reusable Bags, Recyclable Containers and Straws available at a reasonable cost to all customers.

3. Requirements for Paper Bags. Where a Retail Establishment or Food Provider makes a paper bag available to a customer at the point of sale, the bag shall meet the definition of a Recyclable Paper Bag.

4. Requirements for Paper Straws. Where a Retail Establishment or Food Provider makes a paper straw available to a customer at the point of sale, the straw shall meet the definition of a Biodegradable Paper Straws.

8.65.040 – Enforcement and Penalties.

1. Responsible Party. A person who is in charge or in control of a Retail Establishment or Food Provider or who exercises authority over the establishment or business that is not in compliance with this Chapter 8.65 shall be liable for any violations of this Chapter.

2. Penalty. A violation of this Chapter is a Civil Infraction enforceable under City of Mosier Municipal Code Chapter 2.10 (Civil Enforcement), with a minimum fine of not less than \$200 for each offense. Each single-use plastic bag, plastic straw, polystyrene foam container, and non-recyclable paper bag provided or made available in violation of this Chapter constitutes a separate offense.

3. Enforcement implementation. Enforcement of this Chapter shall will begin May 5, 2018 for retailers.
